# FROM The REV. DR. COLE HARTIN, Associate Rector

This is the time of year I like to take stock of my life.

I don't know what it is, but by late August, and into September, I am looking back and looking ahead. For some people this kind of introspection best fits in the long dark nights around the New Year. But, perhaps because I was a student so long, and, maybe, because much of the church year is roughly aligned with the school year, I find myself thinking a lot about the meaning of my life in late summer and early autumn.

The retrospective piece has me looking back over the goals I made for myself over the past year about the kind of husband and father I wanted to be, about the kind of Christian and pastor I wanted to be, about the many books I wanted to read, and the many articles I wanted to write. I never seem to be able to make the progress I am aiming for. Moreover, the progress I do make feels closer to crawling a few inches toward the person I want to be than any of the wild illusions of betterment that I had imagined I might have attained. *(continues on page 2)*

This does little to chasten my imagination as I look ahead to the year ahead. My ambitions are just as big and outrageous as they've always been, while my track record ought to be a reminder that the pace of real life is quite slow, and I need to adjust my plans accordingly.

As I look back and look ahead, I sometimes feel a sense of satisfaction at the work I have done, but more often than anything I feel a little blue that I am another year older and the span of life ahead of me is one year shorter. I can also feel a little discouraged about the many, many times I've missed the mark, which for me is far more common than hitting it.

I guess that's why I find the Parable of the of the Pharisee and the Tax Collector (Luke 18:9-14) so comforting. In this parable, Jesus tells us of two men that went up to pray. The pharisee is the most respectable of the two, and he lists his long stream of religious accomplishments before God. It's truly impressive. He seems like a stand up guy.


And then there's the other fellow, the tax collector. He stands outside of the spotlight, eyes downcast, beating his breast, begging God to have mercy upon him, a sinner.

Jesus tells us it was this mess of a man who walked away justified. The loser is the one who found peace with God.

And this is hopeful to me. Because as much as I'd like to be a Pharisee, and to read through a laundry-list of things I've done well in the life of faith, as a parent, as a writer, instead I am left realizing all the ways I've fallen short.

My prayer then, is a lot more like the tax collector's, a plea that God would have mercy on me a sinner. Whatever real hope I have is not centered on this year being a little bit better, but on God who has mercy on those who fail to live up to expectations.

The parable is a reminder, in other words, that grace is found not when we are at the top of our game, but when we fumbled it up. And this is wonderfully good news. It means that God in Christ is always there when we least deserve it, dispensing mercy and love and grace that we can barely ask for. Just recognizing this brokenness before Jesus is enough to lighten our step, for "whoever exalts themselves will be humbled, and whoever humbles themselves will be exalted" (Luke 18:14b).

#### The Vital Bond Between Liturgy and Music

"The aim and final end of all music should be none other than the glory of God and the refreshment of the soul."

Nestled atop Sewanee Mountain in southeastern Tennessee lies the sleepy college town of Sewanee, home to The University of the South, a leading seminary of the Episcopal Church. Though it can be called by many names, there is a group that refers to this locale as "The Holy Mountain." That group is composed of Episcopal Organist/Choirmasters, Directors of Music, choristers, and even an Assistant Organist or two who converge upon the mountain each July for the Sewanee Church Music Conference, after pressing "general cancel" (sorry, that's organist speak) at the end of the spring choral season.

The conference is a week filled with rehearsals, workshops, and worship services where conferees can glean skills, techniques, and knowledge necessary for bringing quality music to their local congregations. A valuable experience, to be sure.

I have been fortunate to have the privilege of attending this conference for the past two summers as the Assistant Organist of Christ Church, Tyler and its benefit to me cannot be overstated. Not only musically and professionally, but also as a welcome change of pace and scenery. Notably absent upon the "Holy Mountain" was the din of the ever present traffic of North Main in Gladewater, where I reside. In its place was a sound I had nearly forgotten, the conversing of songbirds. The hot, humid summer air that we're accustomed to here in East Texas was replaced with a cool, refreshing atmosphere, making it pleasant to be outside at any time of day. Of course, that is to say nothing of the breathtakingly beautiful Gothic architecture found throughout the campus. Even further, all I had to do was show up for rehearsals with my binder (we call it the conference bible), and sing as instructed. No need to spend hours on the practice bench laboring over voluntaries, hymns, and anthems (not that I'm complaining-I would never!). That would, and has, come soon enough.

Despite the delight of all I have just described, the real highlight of the conference—the best part—was stepping into the cavernous nave of the stunningly Anglican All Saints' Chapel prior to some of the morning services, and being enveloped by the sound of the conference organist practicing the many notes she would be called upon to play during the week. It was the perfect setting for us to turn our hearts and minds to worship.

Though there were many other services that week, including Compline, a full Choral Evensong and the Sunday morning Rite II Eucharist, the Rite I liturgy for the departed on Wednesday morning stood out as the most edifying and meaningful of all, for two reasons. The first reason being the richness of the liturgy and its ability to minister to the souls of those present in the most sublime of ways. As someone who is a transplant into the Episcopal Church from a more evangelical tradition, I still marvel at the depth of the liturgy as I have the opportunity to peel back its many and mysterious layers. I'm sure that on occasion even "cradle Episcopalians" find themselves in awe of its richness. Words like those found in this collect, used during the service, seldom fail to remind us of the security we have in Christ, along with those who have come, and gone, before us in The Faith:

"Grant us, with all who have died in the hope of the resurrection, to have our consummation and bliss in thy eternal and everlasting glory, and, with all thy saints, to receive the crown of life which thou dost promise to all who share in the victory of thy Son Jesus Christ; who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen."

You may have noticed that as yet I have scarcely mentioned music. After all, it was the Sewanee CHURCH MUSIC Conference. One would expect music to be the immediate focus of this piece of writing. That brings me to the second reason for my connection to this particular service. It was inescapably clear that every musical selection for this somewhat intimate service was chosen for the sole purpose of serving and elevating the liturgy. The hymns, voluntaries, and service music were all clearly chosen especially with this in mind and I was left with the very clear conviction that, as a church musician–your Assistant Organist–my role is to select music and approach music assigned by Mr. Ford with one primary focus in mind.

That focus must be that the music that fills and facilitates our worship must point our minds to the liturgy, which, in turn, points our hearts to Christ and Him crucified. That begins with any musical selections that the two of us make, and continues with our approach to those selections, all the way down to the way we prepare the organ for performing them during the service. I'll spare you the details of that.

You see, it is not enough for us to select and prepare music simply for its own sake. Rather, the music must fulfill its purpose in our worship setting. That is, to bring glory to God, as J.S. Bach so eloquently opined in the words at the opening of this article. And even further than that, it must point the listener to our Lord and Savior, through the liturgy. My prayer is that those of us who are called to this ministry, in this assembly and others, do so with our eyes turned to Jesus, and with our hearts prepared to receive the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, to the Glory of God the Father.

Now, we all settle back into the routine that comes with the end of summer. School schedules resume (to the delight of some and to the chagrin of others), our regular service schedule returns, and the Christ Church Chancel Choir returns to the stalls with a calendar FULL of rehearsals, services, and special events. And we do so with a renewed fervor for our role, purpose, and, dare I say, our calling to lift our hearts and minds to the great work of the Liturgy–through music.

The practice bench is calling. I'll see you in church.




