



### FROM THE RECTOR:

Established by Saint Comgall in 558AD in Bangor, Northern Ireland, Bangor Abbey was one of the brightest lights in the European 'Dark Ages.'

The Irish monks committed to three rules – patience, humility, and the love of the Lord.

Their ministry was transformational. Teams from Northern Ireland traveled to Scotland, northern England, France, Switzerland, and northern Italy to evangelize and disciple the German tribes who had overrun the Roman Empire in the 5th century. Deeply learned, their scriptoriums produced exceptional copies of the Bible, and they prepared copies of other essential works of Greek and Roman literature which would likely have been lost without their efforts.

At the heart of their life at the Abbey, though, was worship.

The monks gathered for worship nine times a day. And the center of their worship was prayer and singing. They sang the Psalms and great hymns night and day. At its height, well over three hundred monks, from throughout the Christian world, lived, worked, and worshipped at Bangor Abbey. And they founded hundreds of monasteries and schools throughout western Europe.

Autumn is near, and a new season is coming to Christ Church. Exciting new Sunday school classes, neighborhood groups, Bible studies and more are beginning. But the heart of our life together is worship.

I invite you to renew your commitment to weekly worship. Nurture your love of the Lord though offering God your prayers and your praise in church every week.

### The Blessing of the Pets

On Sunday, October 6, we will have the Christ Church annual blessing of the pets at Bergfeld Park. This blessing always takes place on the Sunday following the Feast Day of St. Francis which in the Church Calendar is on October 4. St. Francis is probably the most well-known and most loved of all the saints. Francis is remembered, even by many non-Christians, for his love of nature. There are many back yards in Tyler with a concrete statue of the saint with a bird perched on his shoulder.

This is from Father James Martin's book My Life with the Saints:



The Little Flowers of
St. Francis of Assisi is a
compendium of
charming stories about
the saint. While a number
of them are clearly legendary, they effectively
convey many of the
saint's most important
qualities: his gentle spirit,
his love of nature, his
desire for peace. Included, for example, is the tale
of Francis preaching to
the swallows (who are

rudely disturbing the Masses with their loud chirping). My favorite is the story of the wolf of Gubbio, a fearsome animal who has so terrorized the town that both men and women are afraid to venture beyond its walls. Taking pity on Gubbio, Francis decides to speak with "friar wolf." *The Little Flowers* recounts what happens after Francis asks the wolf if there can be peace between him and the town.

At these words, the wolf, by movements of his body and tail and eyes, and by bowing his head, showed that he accepted what St. Francis said and was determined to observe it. Thereupon St. Francis spoke to him again, saying, "Friar wolf, because it seems good to you to make and keep this peace, I promise you that, so long as you shall live, I will cause you to be fed regularly by the men of this city, so that you shall no more suffer hunger. For I know full well that whatever evil you have done, you have done out of hunger. But seeing that I beg for you this grace, I desire, friar wolf, that you should promise me that never from now on will you injure any human being or any animal. Do you promise me this?" And the wolf, by bowing his head, gave evidence that he promised it. . . . Then St. Francis held forth his hand to receive his fealty, and the wolf lifted up his right forepaw

and put it with friendly confidence in the hand of St. Francis, giving thereby such token of fealty as he was able. Then St. Francis said, "Friar wolf, I command you in the name of Jesus Christ to come now with me, in confidence, and let us go and establish this peace in the name of God." And the wolf went with him obediently, like a gentle lamb, at which the citizens marveled greatly.

The wolf, by the way, holds to his promise. He becomes a welcome visitor to Gubbio who "entered familiarly into its houses" and was "courteously nourished" by the inhabitants. And when he died, friar wolf was lamented, for he reminded the citizens of the "virtue and sanctity of St. Francis."

Who knows whether or not this legend is true, but we actually know a lot about Francis' life and the following story is true. While praying in a church in San Damiano, Francis heard Christ speaking to him from the cross telling him to "go and repair my house." So he went to his father's warehouse, stole a bolt of scarlet cloth, sold it, brought the proceeds to the parish priest, and asked to stay there in order that he might help rebuild the church.

Francis' father brought public charges against him, and on April 10, 1206, after being summoned by the bishop to account for his actions, Francis stood before a crowd of townspeople in the square of Assisi, not far from his father's house. The Bishop told Francis to return his father's money and place his trust in God. Francis did what he was told, and Francis added this: "The clothes I wear are also his. I'll give them back." With that, he stripped off his clothes and laid them at his father's feet and stood naked in the square.

The bishop wept, stunned by the force of Francis's actions, and wrapped the young man in his cope. The symbolism was thus complete: Francis had stripped himself of his allegiance to his father (and, incidentally, to his father's business as a cloth merchant) and was wrapped in the protection of the Church. He had thrown himself entirely on God's providence. He had abandoned the pride of his youth. He had embraced a life of radical poverty, in imitation of Christ.

St. Francis' approach to life is relatively simple – "Love them." As our beloved pets are being blessed on October 6, let's remember Francis' love of nature, but perhaps more importantly his imitation of Christ in his love of the outcast and the disinherited.

### New Sunday School Curriculum


