

I was driving home from church one day on a sultry summer afternoon. My car had been baking for hours on the blacktop of the Christ Church parking lot, so when I got in, I started to sweat a little bit. Beads of perspiration formed on the bridge of my nose so that my glasses started to slip. I pushed them back by the nosepiece, and, when they started to slide again, I pulled them by the arm. The arm of my glasses broke! Clean off! I couldn't believe. They were just over a year old.


I can get by well enough without glasses for a little while, so I drove home and made an appointment with the optometrist for an exam so I could get a new pair. In the

meantime, I figured I'd rummage around for an old pair to get me through until then. Turns out that my second-most recent set of spectacles fell victim to the sticky hands of my toddler and were no longer serviceable. I did manage to scrounge up

my third-most recent pair, which were several years old. They did not age well. The paint on the frames was starting to flake, and the lenses were very well scratched and scraped. When I first put them on, I saw everything through their smudge.

But then something interesting started to happen over the course of the week I wore these very old glasses. I slowly stopped noticing how bad I was seeing. My brain made the flip from seeing the scratchy surface to seeing through the scratchy surface. My vision was still impaired by the glacial scuffs on the lenses, but I stopped taking notice. It just started to feel normal.

This past week, after I had visited with the doctor, got a prescription, and picked out a new pair, I finally realized my blindness. When my new glasses were ready, a very nice lady took them and sprayed some solution on then. Then she picked them up in two cloths and expertly buffed the lenses, stopped, furrowed her brow as she held them to the light, and went at it again. By the time she was done, they were crystal clear. She said, "I hope I didn't miss a spot."



I said, "I doubt it. They will never be this clean again."

She passed them to me, and I donned them, and looked out the window. Everything was sparkling and clear. My eyes were flooded with light. It was as if I wasn't even wearing glasses.

I realized then how poorly I was seeing with the old glasses. I had gotten used to the blur. It was only by trying on a new pair that I realized what I was missing.

"Thank you," I said, and left the store to drive home.

I started to wonder how many of us are living the Christian life with smudgy and scratched eyes of faith.

As Christians, all of us have had a sparkling experience of grace, but over time our faith can start to dull. Sometimes sin slips in and makes its mark. Other times the busyness of life crowds out our commitment for worship on Sundays. Other good things: Family, travel, work, they start to leave a

trace and pretty soon, though we are Christians and we feel fine, there isn't much light left reaching the eyes or our hearts.

As we begin a new month and reset our service schedules here at Christ Church, we get a natural opportunity to check up on our eyes of faith. Are we really seeing as well as we thought? Maybe it's time to re-up on some commitments we've made to God, and to ourselves. This might mean starting to say morning prayer again, returning to reading the Bible, or making it a priority to be in worship. It might mean going to confession, or reaching out to pray with that friend whom we haven't seen in way too long.

The question we need to ask ourselves is not, "Am I getting along well enough as a Christian?" but rather, "What is God's best for me?" If we ask this, and are open to an answer, God may just sharpen our vision once again.

#### The Psalms of David

The chancel choir will be singing the Psalms in the morning services. The singing of the Psalms in Anglican chant represents one of the Episcopal Church's beloved traditions.

The Psalms are meant to be sung, accompanied by a stringed instrument. Historically they are attributed to King David and considered as the most treasured book in the scriptures. There are 150 psalms.

The Psalter as it appears in the Book of Common Prayer, is especially designed for singing. Verses are split in two marked by an asterick—reflecting the two-part versification form of the original Hebrew. The most common verse is a couplet, but triplets are frequent and quatrains are not unknown. The Book of Common Prayer has prescribed them to be used during all the daily office and most liturgical services. Over the course of a thirty-day cycle, the entire Psalter is sung.

Here at Christ Church the Psalms are either Responsorial recitation (reader alternates with the congregation) or Anglican Chant sung by the choir. (*chant is done in four-part and the rhythm is determined by the natural flow of the words.*)

An endowment fund for repair and maintenance of facilities is a fund that supports upkeep of facilities on both campuses. It exists separate from the general operating budget, and is earmarked for projects that are above and beyond the established programs of the church. 


