

FROM THE RECTOR:

"And Joseph also went up from Galilee, out of the city of Nazareth, into Judaea, unto the city of David, which is called Bethlehem; To be taxed with Mary his espoused wife, being great with child. And so it was, that, while they were there, the days were accomplished that she should be delivered. And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn.

And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Saviour, which is Christ the Lord."" Luke 2.4-11 (KJV)

Childbirth is certainly one of the most remarkable events human beings ever experience. Painful. Hopeful. Exhilarating!

The most important birth in history went largely unnoticed. No one helped Mary and Joseph as they walked for a week—at full term—from Nazareth to Bethlehem. No Heads of State were present to welcome the King of Kings. Mary's parents and in-laws were not there. No doctors or nurses assisted in a teenage girl's delivery of her newborn son.

Yet God did choose to tell a handful of people what was happening. Wise men from the East did not know the details, but they knew a king was coming and followed His star. And an angel of the Lord announced to a team of shepherds that the Savior—the Christ—was born!

God does not always loudly telegraph His plans to us. Often we must listen attentively to hear God's Word. I invite you this Christmas to be still and bend your ear to the voice of the Lord. His Word is clear—The Savior is Here! Rejoice and receive Christ the Lord as your King!

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A few years ago, I wrote a piece for *The Living Church* magazine about one my favorite books to read at Christmas. This book is William Kurelek's *A Northern Nativity*, a reimagining of the Christmas story for the children. Sadly, this year my copy is still boxed up in storage with my other books while we are in the last leg of our renovation at Christ Church Downtown. I won't be able to get my hands on it until after Christmas, but I wanted to share it with you, in case you might be searching for a last minute Christmas gift for someone special.

The book is important to me because it brings the Incarnation of the second person of the Trinity close to home. Jesus's birth, it reminds us, is not as far away as we sometimes think. Jesus becomes like one of us in the truest sense. In the article, I wrote

In this beautifully illustrated volume, Kurelek walks the reader through a sequence of dreams. He writes from the perspective of himself as a 12-year-old boy and suggests that these dreams occurred leading up to the Christmas season. Kurelek evokes a trance-like atmosphere with his prose and images that brings to mind the same tranquil ambiance as The Polar Express.


While many children's Christmas stories play up vague sentimentality, or cheap moralism, A Northern Nativity sets itself apart with a sustained reflection on the incarnation, the Holy Family, and how we might easily dismiss them.

The book is set up so that each dream is portrayed with an image, and an adjacent page of text that describes the scene, including the 12-year-old William's reaction to it. Each dream is a reimagining of the nativity of Christ in many of the varying landscapes of Canada, from the Rocky Mountains in the West, to barren fields, greasy car garages, and fishing shacks on the East Coast. The only constant is harsh conditions, and reverent depictions of Mary, Joseph, and Jesus making their way as a family. I described in a bit more detail Kurelek's background as an artist, and a little bit more of what he did in *A Northern Nativity*. I concluded by saying,

The combined force of the book is a reminder of the humanity of Christ, that he took on flesh among a particular people, and entered the world not as a universal man, but as a poor, first-century Jew. Kurelek imagines what Christ's incarnation might look like in Canada at the time he was writing, in the nitty-gritty, often heartbreaking realities of life. In all of the images, the Holy Family is poor, often relying on the kindness of strangers. These images stir the heart and evoke love for Christ, somehow bringing greater attention to what he suffered by recasting his life among different people in a different time.

As we prepare for Christmas once again, I am trying to meditate on the reality of Christ's coming to us. The substance of

his coming was glorious, but the conditions into which he entered the world were anything but. The Christmas story is a reminder, among other things, that God comes to us in the midst of poverty and adversity, in the most unlikely of circumstances. As much as we try to avoid these challenges, God in Christ meets us right here in the middle of them.




After nearly two and a half decades of excellent service to Christ Church, Diana Keesey will be retiring in late-January as our Parish Administrator.


Holy Eucharist Noon Thursdays Advent-Christmastide Dec. 5, 12, 19 & Jan 2

"Happy Advent to all!"

As someone who did not grow up in a liturgical denomination, the cyclical nature of the church's Calendar year is a sweet gift to my forgetful human mind. Every year, Advent reminds me that the waiting we experience now is quite similar to the waiting the Jewish people experienced in anticipation of the Messiah. They waited for his coming as we wait now for his return. How long those 400 years of silence between the Old and New Testament must have been. How long the past 2,000 years of waiting have been. And yet, from this waiting, we are brought to our knees each year on Christmas Day at the feet of a newborn baby, calling him Lord and Savior as he cries for his mother. The scandal of the Gospel, that God himself would be made human, and the most vulnerable of all humans. So tiny and fragile.

Working in Children's ministry, as I learn about the quirks of kids, I wonder what Jesus experienced as he grew up. What did he like to bite on when he was teething? Did he skin his knees? Did he catch a stomach bug, or wrestle with his brothers? Did he talk to God at night and tell Him about his day when everyone else was asleep? I'm thankful that Advent comes each year, because each year I need the same reminder: 'For God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him should not perish but have eternal life." (John 3:16)

CCS-the 8th at 10 AM, the 15th at 10 AM, and the 21st at 9 AM.


CCD- the 15th at 10 AM, the 21st at 1 PM, and the 22nd at 1 PM.


