FROM THE RECTOR:

From kindergarten classes to nursing home common rooms, February 14 is filled with hearts, candy, flowers, and more.

The story of Valentine's Day is clothed in mystery. February has long been celebrated as a month of romance, and St. Valentine's Day contains vestiges of both Christian and ancient Roman tradition.

Cheryl O'Malley notes that Saint Valentine ministered in the third century, at a time of extreme persecution of Christians. Emperor Claudius II declared young men could not marry because it weakened them as soldiers.

In response, Father Valentine married young lovers in secret. Claudius responded by ordering the priest to be executed. While in prison, Valentine ministered to his jailer's ill daughter. Before his execution, on February 14, 270 A.D., he sent her a note signed "From your Valentine." Father Valentine, the friend of sweethearts, became a martyr to love and the sanctity of marriage.

Another legend holds that Valentine was executed for helping Christians escape from Roman prisons. To "*remind them of God's love and to encourage them to remain faithful Christians,*" Saint Valentine is said to have cut hearts from parchment, giving them to soldiers and persecuted Christians, a possible origin of the widespread use of hearts on Saint Valentine's Day.


Perhaps there is truth to these legends. They certainly inspire us to share God's love with others in extraordinary ways.

from the associate rector... The Rev. Dr. Cole Hartin, Associate Rector

One of the challenges (for me, anyways) of pastoral ministry is that every week I have to come up with something to say on Sunday morning. I have to write a sermon or homily.

I take this seriously. I see it as one of the weightiest tasks of the pastoral vocation, alongside of celebrating the sacraments and visiting with parishioners. Moreover, I spend a lot of time on sermons each week—as much as I can. For me this process involves praying, thinking, writing, reading, revising, and of course preaching.

The greatest challenge of coming up with a sermon each week (again, for me) is this nagging feeling that I am saying too much or too little.

Saying too much is the riskiest. Each week I have the burden and privilege of saying something useful and edifying for the people of God. And the only way I know how to do that is to try to draw out or shine a spotlight on something the Triune God has already spoken in Holy Scripture. But that God has already spoken in Holy Scripture leaves me questioning what I could possibly add that would have any substance or value.

One of the great gifts, I think, of the Anglican tradition is we read a whole lot from the Bible before the minister says anything about it. God speaks first, and then we do our thing to kind of highlight something God has said. But all we have is our words, our experiences, some little thing we've read here or there to which we might allude. We might show a picture on a slide.

There is part of me that wishes each Sunday I could just stand up in the pulpit and preach a one sentence sermon: "What Jesus said! Amen." Or "What the Psalm said! Amen." I am not special. I don't have any unique insight into the life of Christ. So I pray that I can say something useful and true that might point people to Jesus.


In the second case, though, I am also conscious that it is possible to say too little. I think the greatest liability we face as Christians is familiarity with what God has spoken in Holy Scripture. We've just become too accustomed to hearing it, so that we no longer really hear it, if you know what I mean. And because of this, I see my job as kind of like a little pinch or prod. I have to say enough to remind us how strange and wonderful our faith is. I'm the guy who has to say out loud everything that as Christians we know deep-down but seldom think about: God created us, he loves us, he sends Jesus for us, we have hope in him, the Holy Spirit lives within us, and so forth.

So each week, after preparing a sermon or a homily, I vacillate between the feeling of having said too much (perhaps the greatest risk) or too little.

But here is the neat thing: No matter how I feel about my sermon, God has a way of taking it and directing it to hit people's hearts. This is a work of the Holy Spirit. He takes the dirt of what I have to say or think, enriched with the Word of God, and from it draws real beauty and growth and flourishing. Flowers grow in manure.

Some weeks I say too little. Some weeks not enough. But by the grace of God, words from a sinner like me are borne up by the Word and provide hope and healing and sustenance in Jesus' name.

We are also still taking sign ups for our high school mission trip to Belize. Please reach out with any questions.




